

ATrip At Last!

Having suffered Covid-19 lock-down in St Osyth for months just as the weather warmed up, Endeavour came home to Leigh Marina for the final stages of repairs and painting. Almost every event planned for 2020 had been cancelled or postponed. Then the Association of Dunkirk Little Ships invited us to join them at St Katherine's Dock.

A list of members to join the trip upriver was assembled for September 4th with the return on the 11th. Two day before sailing came the sad news that 20 odd little ships from

the upper Thames could not join us because the river under Hammersmith Bridge was closed to traffic due to the bridge's unstable state. It was decided to go anyway.

Skipper Paul Gilson and Cameron McGregor were the heroes of the day, taking Endeavour out of Leigh Marina to a Ray mooring in the small hours and then picking up members from Holehaven slip at 0830. The weather was fine but breezy and the passage upriver on the flood tide was enjoyed by all.

We arrived off the dock at 1345 and er, Glen Jones and Eddie waited until the lock opened at 1430. good time was had by all!

Endeavour was given a prestigious berth near the bridge into the city. She was dressed overall complete with the Little Ships' jack. An interpretive board was left in full view, plus after an inspiration from Rob Everitt, an enlarged QR code to allow the public access to the Endeavour website.

Also on board were Paul Burden (an addition to Endeavour's register of 'skippers') Chris Burls, Mike & Sam Shelley (from the www.leigh-onsea.com web site) John & Tom Savill, Mark Steen and friends Clare Warner, Glen Jones and Eddie Barnes. A good time was had by all!



The trip home, which had been scheduled for the IIth had to be brought forward to the afternoon of Sunday the 6th. This decision was brought on by a combination of the lack of other little ships and the marina fees.

Unfortunately those members, who had opted for the IIth were unable to change their plans, so it was with Allan Barttram skippering and Rob Everitt and Chris Burls as crew that *Endeavour* had an idyllic run back to Leigh on a lovely sunny afternoon and evening.

New member, Mike Shelley reflected: "You hear that it is a small boat but you don't really realise how small until you have to get on it. It was very cosy on deck with around 10 other people. The boat was built around 1926 and is not ideal

for long distance travel (it would roll about hard every time another boat went past). Travelling to Dunkirk and back is not an easy journey in peacetime, let alone in 1940 where it was rescuing



When Endeavour Went To Westminster

Fishermen are once again asking for greater control of the seas as the country tries to secure trading deals with the European Union. When we joined the Common Market fishermen were just as militant about their rights and took their protests to the heart of London.

Endeavour's former owner, Peter Wexham had a leading part in the protest with his partner, Dave Spurgeon. Recalling the protest Peter said: "It was always hard to make a living whilst having a family and a mortgage as well as the expenses of the boat and this was a very hard decision in my life.

"We were going into the Common Market and the Government claimed all the resources under the sea, oil, as and aggregates but gave away our fish to European control. I made a banner with 'S O S' on it, standing for 'Save Our Soles'. The 'O' was shaped like a lifebelt and it was quite good even if I say so myself. We joined the flotilla of boats from all around the country on our day of protest at Westminster. It was a long trip up

the River and we had some local press with us. As we went through docklands all the cranes lowered their jibs to us as we went past. It was a tremendous sight which I don't think had ever happened before except when Churchill's funeral went past the docks.

"Once we got up the river the Police and the PLA stopped us and we were all told to moor up but just one small boat could go through Tower Bridge to happened before, it may have done for Churchill if his trip went past the docks but this I do not remember. Once we got up the river the Police and the PLA stopped us and we were all told to moor up but they said just one small boat can go through Tower Bridge to make the protest and it was down to the Endeavour to do this with the worlds cameras watching, They stopped the traffic and raised Tower Bridge so we could go through up to London Bridge and back down again to join the fleet.

"The fishermen were put on a pleasure boat to go up to Westminster Pier along

with the TV cameras and crews. The protesters wanted to be seen and crowded in front of them which led to howls of protest from the skipper who had lost control of the boat as the weight forward had lifted the rudder propeller out of the water!

"We did our march along Whitehall and the Embankment to Big Ben where a coffin with signs on it saying, 'British fish for British fishermen' was launched off the bridge into the water. We watched it go down river until the PLA got it out as a hazard to shipping. It was a sad day and I had a bad headache which for some reason I always did when I went to London. I asked Dave to drop me off at Tilbury where I got the train home. The next day I talked to my family and Dave and sold him my share in the business and never went on board her again until we found her years later in Rochester."

"Even though you're the smallest thing on the water, a lot of landmarks don't look as imposing as



they are when you're on land; Tower Bridge isn't so big when you approach it and, while the Dartford Crossing feels massive when you're going over it, its comparatively dinky when you go under it.

"Granted, the boat would rock every now and then when something bigger passed us by, but it was mostly smooth sailing (smooth enough to make a few rounds of tea which was surprising). It's only when you get into London that things start to feel unsteady as you feel the wash from other ships keenly when in the narrower part of the river."

> Main financial note this year has been the removal of rot from the boat. As you would have read in the last newsletters, as part of our usual maintenance schedule, we had planned in this year to get the deck re-caulked by Brian Kennell and Shaun White, the boat builders who performed the original restoration.

We took the boat round to their yard in St Osyth, but when they started investigative work, they found a significant amount of rot in the stern deck, rudder and transom, which meant that Endeavour Rob Everitt—Treasurer was laid up over there for much longer than we had originally envisaged.

The final repair bill for 2019/20 was over £16k, over half of which was covered by the wonderful Co-op donation that we

had received in early 2019, and we are so thankful to the people of Leigh-on-Sea and the Coop community fund for making that happen.

We took advantage, whilst Endeavour was laid up over in St Osyth for months, and a bunch of 'willing volunteers' spent some very, very cold and some very, very hot days over in St Osyth, and in Leigh Marina, scraping, sanding and painting her... an experience we won't forget!! She is now looking lovely.

The Trust started the year with a total of £19,172.50 in the bank, and we ended the financial year at the end of August with £6,978.53. Hopefully, normality can ensue in 2020/21 and we can plan some events together... Thank you members!!

Mooring Dug Out Thanks To Leigh Marina



For most of this year Endeavour has not been on display on her usual mooring opposite The Peter Boat. One reason for this was the amount of damage caused by there not being enough depth for the boat to sit comfortably.

Following extensive work with a digger we have been able to alter the mooring lines which should stop chafe on the rudder and hull.

Leigh Marina has been wonderful to us with moorings and servicing work while members were able to come aboard to do general maintenance.

As winter approaches the boat will remain safe from harm in the Marina in the hope we can get to sea next year without social distancing!
